

Explorer: *The Right-click trick*

This is a very simple trick which is really useful when you're using a search engine.

Use the right mouse button and 'open in new'...

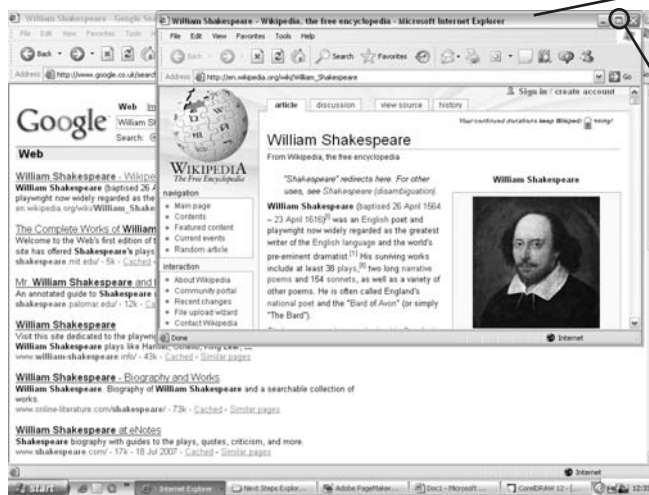
So, I'm doing some research and I'm using a search engine — Google is my own favourite but this works with any of them. I've typed in my search item and it's come up with a nice list of websites for me to have a look at.

But I don't just want to look at one of these pages, I want to look at several of them.

Now, here's the clever bit — instead of clicking on the link using the **left** mouse button, click using the **right**. A little window will come up, and you need to select the second option down, **Open in New Window**.



It opens a new window with that web page in and leaves the one you're using there. After you've had a look you can go back to the search page and try another link, doing the same thing to open yet another window. Or you can go down the search page, doing this to all the entries that might be interesting, then go back and read them all. Very handy if you have a big search to do.



Here's your new window with the search page still visible behind it.

You can click here to make your new window into a full page.

Once you've opened several, you can just click on the Internet Explorer button on the taskbar at the bottom of the screen to bring up a window listing all your open websites. Then click on the one you want to look at and, hey presto, there it is.



If you have version 7 of Internet Explorer you can select "open in New Tab" instead – it's much the same but opens a new tab in the same window.

Extra tip: If you have Internet Explorer 7 you can click the mouse wheel down once to open it in a new tab.
